Current Department for Education (DfE) Covid Guidance

The government has recently updated its national and school guidance on the next steps for living with Covid. Below, in italics, are key sections of the information published by the DfE, which you may find helpful.

"The population now has much stronger protection against Covid-19 than at any other point in the pandemic. This means we can begin to manage the virus like other respiratory infections, thanks to the success of the vaccination

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programme and access to antivirals, alongside natural immunity and increased scientific and public understanding about how to manage risk.

"This will mean:

- Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people. They can go back to school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well enough to attend.
- Children and young people aged 18 and under with a positive Covid-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days.
- Adults with the symptoms of a respiratory infection, and who have a high temperature or feel unwell, should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people until they feel well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature.
- Adults with a positive Covid-19 test result should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 5 days, which is when they are most infectious."

The academy can confirm that government guidance also states that self-test kits should no longer be issued to students.
