FRAMING

COLOUR

From bodies of water to mirrors, reflection photos capture distinctive takes on subjects and scenes. Explore how you can use reflective surfaces to get great shots. You won't be able to move some reflective surfaces, like lakes, puddles or windows, so that means you'll have to move around in order to find the right angles.

Framing refers to using elements of a scene to create a frame within your frame. For example, you might shoot through a doorway, pull back curtains, branches, fences, tunnels, or arches to highlight your subject focus. With this composition, you can create depth in a photo and makes it more interesting.

We use colour in photography to create visual contrast, direct attention, evoke mood, and more. Colour can impact our viewers' emotional response to an image. It can draw attention to a subject OR cause it to get lost within the frame – either intentionally or unintentionally. The colours we choose and how we arrange them within the frame impact the effectiveness of our imagery.
