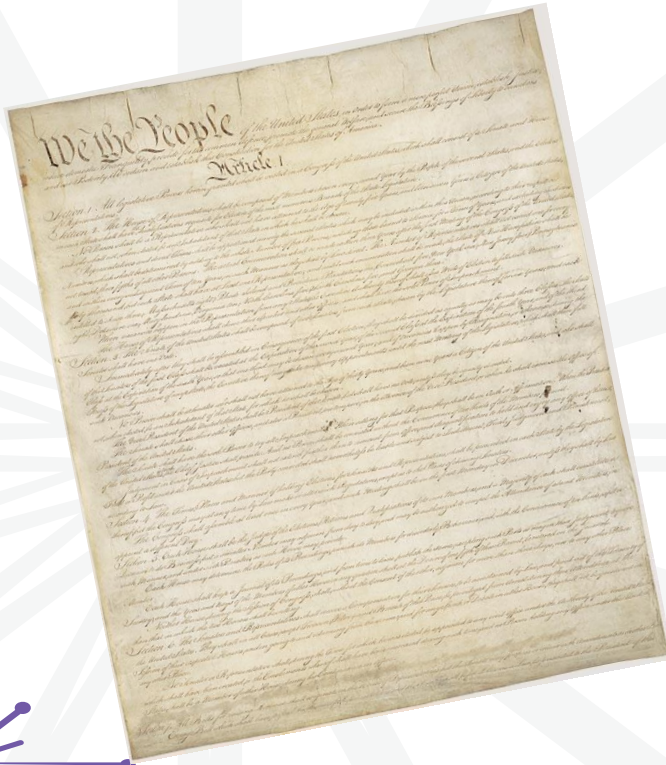


The UK does not currently have a codified constitution, what would you include?




1. Form into small groups, introduce yourself!
