Since leaving the Academy to study at university Abbie has continued to push herself both academically and on the track. She has recently broken into the GB and England women's senior teams and has found instant success. Just before Christmas 2019 she was part of the GB women's senior team that took gold at the European Cross Country Championships, finishing in 13th place individually. At the start of January 2020 she once again got a taste of gold in the Stirling Cross Country, representing England women's seniors and finishing in 2nd place individually.

The Robert De Cheney Boarding House gets some new guests. Recent-

ly a local charity called Re-engage Lincoln for people over the age of 75 who live alone and are considered isolated in the area has visited. Many who the charity help struggle to walk, have suffered falls and go weeks without talking to anyone. They meet once a month for a tea party as well as one off events such as going to the panto! The charity's aim over time, is to see the guests gain confidence and combat growing social isolation.

The students engaged with the group, listened to stories and entertained them with musical performances; all whilst enjoying a superbly prepared afternoon tea by the boarding staff.





FUNDRAISING

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Throughout 2019 students and staff from the Academy took part in a number of fundraising activities for Teenage Cancer Trust. This is a charity that is close to the hearts of many members of our community and was therefore chosen as one of our academy charities in 2018-2019. As well as many of the usual fundraising efforts such as bake sales and raffles, Head of Year 13 Mr Strawson took on the challenge of running a 10k race every month for the charity - raising almost £1500 in the process. Upon completing the challenge at the Skegness 10k in December he said this: "It has been a privilege to run in the Teenage Cancer Trust vest this year and even better that friends, family and colleagues have been so generous for such a worthwhile cause. To have run today surrounded by friends and colleagues has been quite emotional." The charity is important to Mr Strawson who, as Head of Year 11 in 2018, helped support the year group through the loss of one of their peers. He added "working with Teenage Cancer Trust in 2017 and 2018 opened my eyes to the amazing work they do - not only in supporting young people with cancer but their friends and family too." The charity is also special to Head of Boarding and Science teacher (and alumna) Miss Bosier, who is running the London Marathon on their behalf in 2020. At the time of writing her training is well underway and we will have an update in the next newsletter of how she got on.

Enrichment Leader and Geography teacher Miss Tunnard, alongside our Fundraising and Community Team (FACT) have been instrumental in raising funds for the charity and we continue to help out we are currently collecting donations of (or towards) toiletries to give to young people admitted to the Teenage Cancer Trust Ward at Queen's Medical Centre in Nottingham.


